DEGREE OVERVIEW

Anthropology is the study of what it means to be human in the broadest sense, through an examination of culture and society (cultural anthropology), the biology and evolution of humans and our closest relatives (biological anthropology), and the study of past human communities and material culture (archaeology, including nautical archaeology). Students develop an appreciation of the value of physical and cultural differences at the local, national and global levels, and learn critical thinking skills that support them in careers that involve working with individuals of diverse national or ethnic backgrounds. Anthropology will help you discover more than just employment – it will help you establish a fulfilling, people-oriented career where you can make a meaningful difference in your own life and in your community.
