Research Interests

I am interested broadly in theoretical and methodological problems in literary and cultural history: periodization; history of authorship; history and sociology of the book; epistemology of reading; history of the literary field.

I have recently completed a book-length manuscript on anonymity. My next project's point of departure is Hume's statement that identity is a grammatical not a philosophical problem. It investigates the genealogy of two key words associated with self-consciousness and self-reflexivity, "epistrophē" and "énunciation." Both have been significant for recent theory, the first by way of Foucault's hermeneutics of the self, the second through Benveniste's "formal apparatus of enunciation."
